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AIC UNVEILS INAUGURAL HALL OF FAME IN 25th YEAR

Associated Independent Colleges has unveiled its inaugural Hall of Fame to celebrate the 25th year of Queensland's largest private school sports organisation.

The list, featuring 25 past students from the eight member schools across Brisbane and Ipswich, includes Olympic, Paralympic and Commonwealth Games medallists among 21 men to have represented their countries.

A total of 11 sports are represented, reflecting the diversity of offerings for AIC students. The Hall of Fame, featuring at least three past students from each of the eight member Colleges, includes:

- Rugby League stars Cooper Cronk (St Laurence's College), David Shillington (Padua College), Christian Welch (Villanova College) and Jared Waerea-Hargreaves (Iona College);
- Brisbane Lions stars Charlie Cameron (Marist College Ashgrove) and Harris Andrews (Padua College) and former Hawthorn player Brendan Whitecross (St Patrick's College);
- Rugby Union internationals from five countries including former Wallabies captain Ben Mowen (Villanova College), Drew Mitchell (St Patrick's College), Moses Sorovi (St Peters Lutheran College), Nick Frisby (Marist College Ashgrove), Sam Johnson (St Edmund's College), Tom O'Toole (Padua College), Luke McLean (St Laurence's College) and James Stannard (St Edmund's College);
- Paralympic summer and winter medallist Simon Patmore (St Patrick's College) and Paralympic Swimming medallist Daniel Fox (Iona College);
- Olympic medallists Dane Bird-Smith (St Peters Lutheran College, Athletics), Tim Howard (Iona College, Hockey) and Pietro Figlioli (Marist College Ashgrove, Water Polo) and Commonwealth Games and world championships gold medallist Jack Cartwright (St Peters Lutheran College, Swimming) and Commonwealth Games medallist Damon Kelly (St Laurence's College, Weightlifting);
- Socceroos and A-League veteran Michael Zullo (Villanova College);
- Olympic Volleyball representatives Andrew Grant (Marist College Ashgrove) and Grant Sorenson (St Edmund's College).



















The Hall of Fame concept recognises 25 years of AIC sport since its member colleges joined from different school sporting competitions. To be eligible for the Hall of Fame, inductees must have played in AIC sports from 1999 onwards. AIC competition is now offered across 14 sports for students from Years 5 to 12.

Each College has chosen its inductees based on their performances but also their contribution to their schools and their conduct as athletes. New inductees will be considered each year, building on the quality of the inaugural group.

"AIC was established 25 years ago to enable Colleges with similar goals and a similar approach to sport to provide competition for students," Marist College Ashgrove Head of College and 2023 AIC Chair Michael Newman said.

"Our offerings are not primarily about the pursuit of sporting victories. They are about the holistic development of our young men. The AIC vision is to develop good and healthy young people through sport and competition within a Christian context.

"We aim to help our students become good people, good citizens, and good workers in our communities in years to come. This approach is underpinned by the motto from our AIC charter: Learning and growth through sport and competition.

"This Hall of Fame brings together some of our past students who have excelled after they have left our colleges. We are proud of their achievements just as we are proud of the many young people who will participate in AIC sport every weekend."

The inductees include the likes of Cronk and Kelly, who played in the St Laurence's College First XV rugby union team together before excelling in other sports, earning their nominations for the Hall of Fame for Rugby League and Weightlifting respectively.

Andrews and Cameron are the modern flagbearers for the AIC adoption of Australian Rules as a full sport. The Lions teammates attended last week's Open age clash between their former schools Padua College and Marist College Ashgrove.
